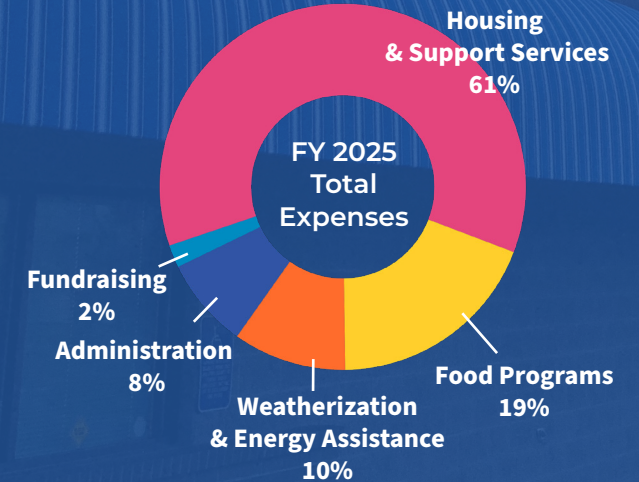
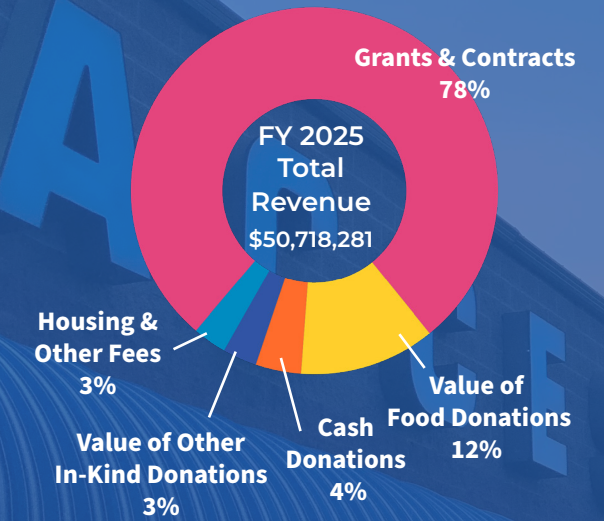
A YEAR IN REVIEW

ACCESS Food Programs are a vital resource for Jackson County. Our network of more than 30 food pantries, including mobile and senior-focused pantries, and our child-focused weekend food program are lifelines for tens of thousands of people in our community.

WARMTH and WEATHERIZATION

ENERGY ASSISTANCE and WEATHERIZATION

Energy and Weatherization programs help address immediate and long-term energy needs.

3,706 households received energy assistance helping **7,540** Jackson County residents

\$2.4 million of energy assistance provided

89 homes weatherized - increasing energy efficiency

\$545 average annual utility savings of weatherized homes

SHELTER

HOUSING and HOMEOWNERSHIP PROGRAMS

ACCESS is a certified HUD Housing Counseling Agency and affordable housing provider.

2,307 people received rental assistance

\$9.7 million of rental assistance provided

369 people received homeownership counseling and education

VETERANS PROGRAMS

384 Veteran households received housing stability services

\$2.1 million provided in rental assistance to Veterans

CENTER for COMMUNITY RESILIENCE

1,044 survivors of the 2020 Labor Day wildfires received **6,175** independent services, helping them regain stability in our community.

MEDFORD SEVERE WEATHER SHELTER

2,241 Medford Severe Weather Shelter visits, protecting our community's homeless population during harsh weather conditions.

MEDICAL EQUIPMENT LOAN PROGRAM

6,408 pieces of donated medical equipment loaned at no cost, saving our community hundreds of thousands of dollars.

OVER THE TOP WIG PROGRAM

80 people with cancer and other medical diagnoses received a free wig, hat, or scarf, and styling tips to help them reclaim confidence during challenging times.
